


## When Hope is Fading

In Acts 27, Paul was taken on a dangerous journey from Caesarea to Malta. During the trip, the ship's crew and Paul's shipmates lost hope that they would survive. But Paul continued to listen for God's word. When he heard it, he trusted God, obeyed God, thanked God, and glorified God by serving others.



After leaving Crete (against Paul's advice), the ship encountered a storm that was like a hurricane. It battered the ship for two weeks, leaving them in darkness, without navigational aids, with much of their gear thrown overboard to reduce weight. They were being pushed around by the wind and had no control over their direction. But God brought them safely to the tiny island of Malta.

In the midst of the dark and brutal storm, Paul listened for God's word, and wheard it, he believed it and he acted on that faith and told the good news to

- **4.** Read Hebrews 6:13-20. As a believer in Jesus Christ, in what is your ultimate hope? Where is that hope anchored and how should that influence how you navigate storms today?
