

## Was It By Faith, Or By Works?

We should believe that justification is by faith alone, because it is confirmed by our experience and Abraham's example.

## **Definitions**

**Justification** is an instantaneous legal act of God in which He (1) thinks of our sins as forgiven and Jesus' righteousness as belonging to us, and so (2) declares us to be righteous/not guilty before Him. (Wayne Grudem)

**Legalism** is any attempt to gain acceptance or forgiveness from God through own efforts or merits.

**Sanctification** is the process where a believer progressively become what they have already been declared to be in the court of heaven—righteous. In other words, sanctification is the progressive life long process of a believer becoming more like Jesus in their daily life.
