Questions

- **1.** Matthew 5:17 and 7:12 serve as bookends to a major section of the Sermon on the Mount. How do these two verses relate to each other? What does Jesus mean by the Law and the Prophets?
- 2. Are there ways in which the Sermon on the Mount has felt daunting to you?
- 3. In practical and personal terms, why does it matter that Matthew 7:12 is a positive exhortation and not merely a negative exhortation? What are some ways that this verse challenges you to go beyond a bare minimum of service?
- 4. How did Jesus emphasize the comprehensive nature of this exhortation? How is your application of this exhortation compounded by the words "whatever you wish (desire)"?
- 5. Someone who professes faith quotes Matthew 7:7 in a name-it-and-claim-it fashion, urging you to pray harder or with more faith for a pay raise or healing from a sickness. How does all that you've already studied in the Sermon on the Mount inform your understanding of Ask, Seek, and Knock?
- 6. Read Matthew 7:11. How do Jesus' words help you to pray with persistence about the struggles you are facing? What do you need to be praying about this week?

Matthew 7:12 is the conclusion to a major section of the Sermon on the Mount. It exhorts followers of Jesus to a very high calling, while the rest of the passage (7:7-11) shows us how God wants to equip us to answer His call.

Three Parts to the Sermon on the Mount

- 2. Kingdom Exhortations (5:17-7:12)
- 3. Warnings (7:13-27)
